

Letter from the Board President

I'm thrilled to share the River Parkway Trust's annual report for 2023 with you. As you read through each section, I hope you feel great about the impact your support had last year. I'm incredibly inspired by the number of people who could explore and enjoy the San Joaquin River through the Trust's programs and park operations.

People love the river when it is open to them.

The River Parkway Trust expanded operations of Sycamore Island to 7 days per week beginning in May. More than 19,000 people visited the property to enjoy time fishing, hiking, biking, and wildlife watching. Sumner Peck Ranch has also become a cherished place to enjoy a walk by the river and pick fresh citrus and blueberries, with more than 8,000 visitors last year.

Young people are flocking to the river.

Thanks to the support of generous friends like you, thousands of elementary school students participated in River Field Trips at Sycamore Island, Lost Lake Park, Owl Hollow, and the River Center. More children and youth enjoyed the River Camp experience at seven camp program locations in the summer, the first-ever Fall Foragers mini-camp, and Winter Break camps in Fresno, Madera, and Firebaugh. In 2023, the Trust served more children than ever in the organization's history. Celebrating these future generations of river stewards brings me so much joy.



People love the river so much; they volunteer in all kinds of ways.

Last year, dedicated and enthusiastic volunteers contributed 10,987 hours of service. Volunteers were key to the success of the Trust's Fresno River West E-Pond wildlife habitat enhancement project – 121 people invested 76 hours to help plant 3,314 native trees and shrubs on the project site. In the years to come, these plants will mature and provide habitat for wildlife.

I feel encouraged by what's to come in the year ahead. The River Parkway Trust will continue to seek ways for more people to fall in love with the river as we provide more public access and opportunities for the community to come and enjoy a day on the banks of the San Joaquin River.

Thank you for your support and involvement with the River Parkway Trust.

Message from the Executive Director

As we report on the Trust's work in 2023, I find myself reflecting on my 25 years with the organization. It's been a journey of growing the Parkway through land acquisition, public access improvements, and restored habitat.

When I started with the Trust in 1999, the future Coke Hallowell Center for River Studies (River Center) was a wreck of an old house. The Trust was raising funds to restore the Ranch House and build the Welcome Center that exists today, and many board members, community volunteers, and members of East Fresno Rotary were putting physical labor into the project.

Sycamore Island and Ball Ranch were still in private ownership, and the Thomas MacMichael Sr Loop Trail hadn't yet been constructed at Jensen River Ranch. The acquisition of Spano River Ranch – now known as Fresno River West – was underway, but it would take four more years to complete.

Today, Sycamore Island is protected forever and is open for public recreation seven days a week. Thanks to you, 19,158 people visited Sycamore Island last year. The restored River Center is a hub of activity with various education and community programs that connect people to the rich history of the San Joaquin River. With your support, almost 35,000 people enjoyed the River Center last year.

When I feel like we're not making progress fast enough on the Parkway, it's great to look back and see how far we've come.

But here's something interesting. Throughout my 25 years with the Trust, what I understood as the big challenge to public access was a lack of operations and maintenance funding for Parkway land. In 2021, Assemblymember Joaquin Arambula helped overcome that obstacle by garnering \$15 million in the state budget specifically for operations. And what I've learned since then is this:

Money doesn't make the Parkway. People do.

People like YOU and early pioneers like Coke Hallowell, our founding mothers, first Executive Directors, supportive elected leaders, community leaders, and many

other ranchers, farmers, attorneys, doctors, real estate professionals, university professors, teachers, and bankers – the list can go on-and-on.

We've advocated for our shared vision of a completed Parkway with places for people to gather with friends and enjoy time in nature. River Parkway Trust supporters have generously given of their time, money, and political capital because they believe the Parkway is an important quality-of-life amenity for the San Joaquin Valley. Throughout my time with the Trust, many people have been willing to fight for the Parkway's future.

Back to the wonderful windfall of \$15 million. **It turns out that money isn't enough.** You also need the **will** to make it happen.

The past 3 years have included more operations and maintenance funding for the Parkway than our founders and early supporters ever imagined. And yet, over the past 12 months, we've had less access to Parkway lands than at any other time in my career.



Something is wrong with this picture.

The Trust has a unique and important relationship with the State Conservancy created to build the Parkway. We work closely with Conservancy staff and provide verbal reports on Parkway issues at every Conservancy Board meeting. But the change in the Conservancy's leadership in April 2023 created significant management challenges that shut the doors on public access – even for licensed partner organizations like the Trust.

This experience has cemented my understanding of the importance of having a mix of both public and publicly accessible private land on the Parkway. The land owned by the Trust is private, but sites such as the River Center and Sumner Peck Ranch are open seven days a week for access. While we temporarily lost access to many Conservancy properties, we continued to provide access on our own land. Your support makes it possible for the Trust to steward and provide access to our properties.

The good news is that the Conservancy's new Executive Officer Kari Daniska is on the job and able to move access forward.

Sycamore Island operations are running strong, and Ball Ranch will open for daily public access very soon. But more is still needed. The Parkway isn't finished yet, and we must still advocate for its full completion—that vision of safe, clean public parks, a 22-mile trail system, and a healthy river supporting local wildlife.

I want to thank you for your support and advocacy for the Parkway. I hope you enjoy reading about the great work and accomplishments you helped make possible last year. And as we look forward, I'm asking you to remain steadfast in your support and advocacy to fulfill the Parkway vision.

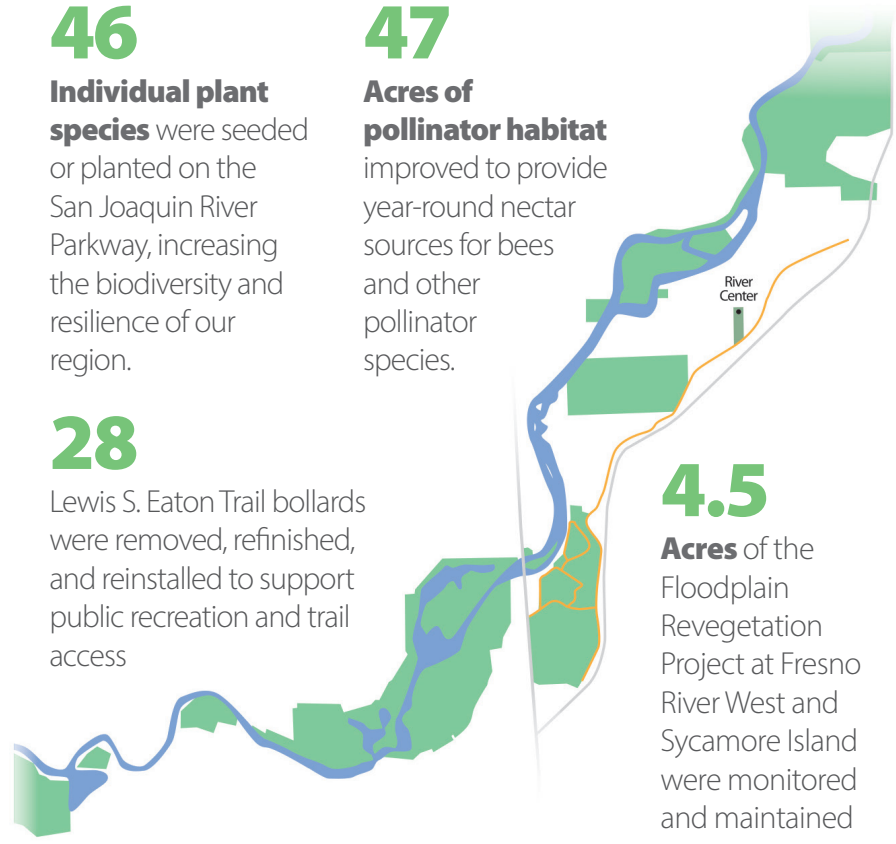

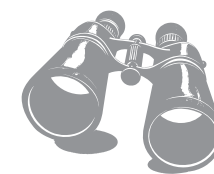

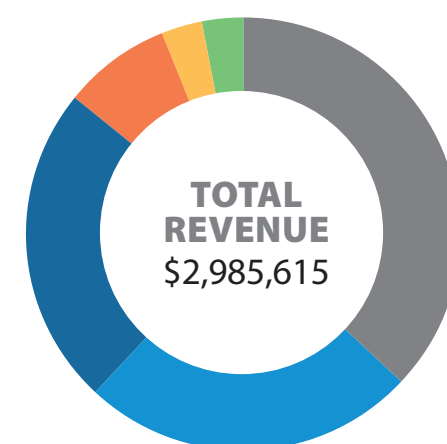

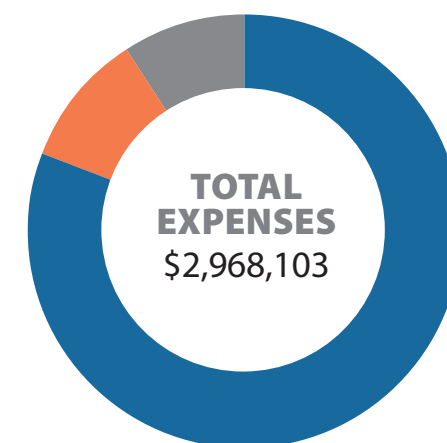
